Transition to High School Action Steps	1. Learn about high school opportunities and get involved in clubs and extracurriculars.	2. Attend PWCS high school specialty programs and <u>GMU Early</u> Identification Program (EIP) information sessions.	3. Discuss postsecondary plans with your counselor and select classes that are aligned.	4. Attend transition events and get familiar with your high school.	5. If needed, expunge high school courses that were taken during middle school.
Career Connected Learning Action Steps	1. Reflect on your skills and values and model these behaviors while in school.	2. Attend <u>career</u> <u>fairs</u> or workplace tours that can help you learn more.	3. Learn more about <u>work-based</u> <u>learning</u> experiences.	4. Ask about <u>credential and</u> <u>certificate</u> opportunities you can earn while in high school.	5. Consider pursuing an internship. These are offered for a variety of industries.
College Action Steps	2. Every class counts. Challenge yourself in advanced courses where you feel strong.	3. Get involved in ways that are authentic to your interests, values, and passion.	4. Complete the apprenticeship program applications by the deadline.	5. Maintain good work habits with a daily routine and organization.
